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Synopsis

Spookley and the Christmas Kittens begins at the North Pole, where Santa discovers a curious green kitten lost in the snow. Naming him Mistletoe, Santa promises to find him a forever home where he will be loved and never alone. But on Christmas Eve, Mistletoe secretly stows away on Santa's sleigh. A gust of wind knocks him off, and he tumbles down to Holiday Hill Farm.

There, Spookley the Square Pumpkin and his farmyard friends are preparing for a Christmas Extravaganza, a celebration of peace, love, kindness, and friendship. When Mistletoe arrives, confused and uncertain of his past, Spookley reaches out to him. Unlike the others, who are puzzled by a green cat, Spookley shows kindness, sensing Mistletoe's loneliness. Mistletoe longs for a home, but what he truly seeks is belonging.

Guided by Leon the raccoon and a magical sack, Mistletoe encounters three stray kittens—Scat, Scram, and Shoo—who, like him, have no home. Though reluctant at first, Mistletoe begins to care for them, protecting them and even risking himself during a snowstorm. Their bond deepens, and when Shoo, the silent kitten, finally speaks to comfort him, Mistletoe realizes he is no longer alone.

Meanwhile, Spookley convinces his friends that helping Mistletoe is the right thing to do, and together they set out into the storm. With Santa's gentle guidance, Leon's help, and Spookley's loyalty, the group finds their way back to the farmhouse. Mistletoe bravely sneaks the kittens inside, instructing them to hide under the Christmas tree so that Farmer Hill's children might discover them on Christmas morning.

When Holly and Buddy awake, they are delighted to find not just three kittens, but also the shy green cat hiding nearby. Instead of being rejected as Mistletoe feared, the children are overjoyed. Buddy places a star-shaped collar around his neck, reading aloud the words: "My name is Mistletoe, and I live on Holiday Hill Farm." With this, Mistletoe finally receives the home and family he longed for.










Gift Giving

Why did Spookley think it was important to go and look for Mistletoe?


Mistletoe was worried that people would be scared of him because he was green. If you have ever felt like someone might not like you, what have you done to show yourself that you are worth liking?


